

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Accelerating Reform Fund

The Department for Health and Social Care (DHSC) has launched a £42.6 million Accelerating Reform Fund (ARF) to boost the quality and accessibility of adult social care by supporting innovation and scaling, and kickstarting a change in services to support unpaid carers.

Last updated: 24 April 2024

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About the fund

The Accelerating Reform Fund (ARF) focuses on embedding and scaling approaches to transform care and support including for unpaid carers, who play such a vital, selfless role in our society. This will accelerate progress towards the government's social care vision where people have choice, control and support to live independent lives, and where care and support is of outstanding quality and is provided in a fair, accessible way.

Local authorities have registered their interest with the DHSC, in partnership with others, in their integrated care systems, to fund local innovation projects. They are expected to work collaboratively with others such as the NHS, care providers, voluntary and community sector groups, including unpaid carers. The ARF is supporting at least two projects per region, one of which will focus on unpaid carers, and consider co-production with both care recipients and unpaid carers, ensuring they are inclusive of local diverse needs.







Projects under this theme focus on supporting individuals to remain in their homes longer, using shared living arrangements, co-housing models, or other collaborative living solutions.

Key risks and challenges identified



1. Shared Lives Carers Recruitment and Retention

- Difficulty attracting a diverse pool of carers
- High turnover rates
- Addressing the aging workforce
- Staffing shortages

2. Community and Staff Awareness /Training on the Scheme

- Low public awareness
- Need for continuous support
- Staffing shortages
- Overcoming resistance to Shared Lives arrangements
- Fostering acceptance of nontraditional care models

Key risks and challenges identified



3. Coproduction, Engagement, and Collaboration

- Ensuring active stakeholder involvement in decision-making
- Developing flexible and responsive service designs
- Engaging hard-to-reach groups

4. Compliance with Quality Standards and Legislation

- Maintaining high-quality care standards
- Addressing reliability amidst project expansion
- Ensuring legal compliance and obtaining necessary certifications
- Aligning with broader policy frameworks

5. Sustainability: Funding and Cultural Change

- Ensuring equitable project design
- Securing funding and resources for scaling projects
- Planning for long-term engagement and partnership building
- Addressing data accessibility for informed decision-making
- Ensuring equality and diversity in care provision
