The major change that is achieved towards the end of the process. It is the main objective that everyone is working towards.

Co-production achievements



Achievements that happen along the journey towards impact. It can also be called short-term outcomes.





The benefits to people taking part in co-production.

Evaluation and feedback



Evaluating and reflecting on the process to learn and improve co-production.

Key learning from people's feedback

- Visual and graphic elements help to make the resource more accessible and make it easier to understand impact
- A pathway to impact template illustration was added to the resource
- Flexibility of the resource people were able to pick the parts of the resource they wanted and adapt language







Key learning from people's feedback

- More accessible language we worked to make language more accessible
- Concise content we reduced the amount of text and simplified the structure of the resource
- Need for more examples we added examples from East **Riding Yorkshire and Buckinghamshire**

Co-production Impact Assessment Framework – Elements

- 1.Pathway to Impact, a 3 step process:
 - Collaborating to decide on outcomes and impact
 - Setting goals to work towards those outcomes (short, medium, long)
 - Identifying activities to achieve goals
- 2.Assessing Outcomes Types of data, examples and ideas.
- 3.Templates and Guidance Questions, talking points, suggestions and knowledge.





How was the framework developed?

SCIE interviewed staff and Experts by Experience from the East Riding of Yorkshire

3 experts from the East Riding Autism & ADHD Partnership Board:

- Sym Co-Chair
- Ankur member and co-chair of the East Yorkshire Parent Carer Forum

SCIE had 1 to 1 conversations to inform the examples, language and format of the framework document.



Why is understanding impact important?

- Impact can differ person to person, community to community \bullet
- Understanding Impact helps people feel their time and energy has been ulletworthwhile
- Impact data helps justify time and spending \bullet
- Forecasting similar time and spending commitments lacksquare
- Identifying limits and aspirations ullet
- Direct data can help to identify indirect "ripples" \bullet
- Convey the worth of co-production to those unfamiliar
