Panel Question Time – Part I

In adult social care, how do we balance an individual's right to make an unwise decision, with our duty to protect the individual under our care and protect them from self neglect, even if they have a DOLs and MCA in place?

If a person wellbeing is being impacted negatively by family visitation, and family gets distressed if not visiting, what would be the best approach

Does the Panel agree that effective adult safeguarding should be based upon multi-agency investigation training for all workers specialising in adult safeguarding, ensuring effective investigation of non-criminal abuse and neglect concerns plus a skilled contribution to police criminal investigations where appropriate?

Panel Question Time – Part II

The appropriateness of determining whether or not abuse or neglect has occurred AND sharing the findings with concerned relatives.

Please can you confirm the requirements/process for community Dols, in context of hospice at home care with NHS commissioned responsibility to provide rapid deterioration support over 12 weeks at home, we provide care directly and use third party contracts from local care/nursing agencies

On occasions safeguarding teams hide behind principle 1, presumption of capacity as an excuse not to act, when they should. Why is the place of understanding and assessing capacity and recognising it is only one consideration in deciding whether a section 42 enquiry is required so badly understood
