Why go Digital?

- To fully realise the EHCH model, a digital infrastructure is required for staff and commissioners that is fit-for-purpose.
- It must permit appropriate access to care records, allow data-sharing for planning of provision, and support the use of assistive technology and telemedicine in care homes.
- The components necessary for such a system are linked health and social care data sets, access to the care record and secure email, and better use of technology in care homes.
- Improving the health and wellbeing of care homes residents through changing care delivery and introducing technology enabled care solutions

What do we need?

- To fully realise the EHCH model, a digital infrastructure is required for staff and commissioners that is fit-for-purpose.
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Digital Red Bags

- Pilot in Sutton, SW London, with a Care Home already using electronic records
- Digital (pdf) red bag documents are sent from a care home's care monitoring system directly to the electronic patient record at the Hospital at admission. The pdf is added to the e-Documents tab on the resident's Hospital's electronic patient record.
- Needed DSPT 'standards met', getting all the relevant contracts agreed and signed, and completing a Data Protection Impact Assessment (DPIA) with all involved organisations
- Pilot phase due for reporting to NHS Digital in April 2019
- Learning; challenging but not impossible!

Care Home care records are an asset too!

Information Governance

The legal framework governing the use of personal confidential data in health care. Incorporates the NHS Act 2006, the Health and Social Care Act 2012, the Data Protection Act, and the Human Rights Act.

The law allows personal data to be shared between those offering care directly to patients but it protects patients' confidentiality when data about them are used for other purposes.



Data Security and Protection Toolkit & NHS Mail

Key benefits of completing the DSP toolkit:

- Access to NHS Mail (able to receive and share confidential information with NHS providers securely and quickly)
- CQC data requirements compliant
- Access to Summary Care Record
- Access to Shared Patient Records e.g. System One or EMIS
- Access to Skype for Business for teleconsultations
